

A cooperatively owned establishment that is value aligned to SSMU and will be providing an array of services to students and community members alike







Urban developer *Concordia Estates* acquires significant chunk of land and proposes demolition of much of the Milton-Parc area

HUNGER STRIKE! On June 9, members of the M.P.C.C. began a hunger strike. They are making the following demands:

 that all demolition in the Milton Park area be stopped,
 that a committee be set up to use the Milton Park alternate plan (see p5 as a basis for the renovation of the losed houses, 3) that charges against the 59 pe be dropped

The Conseil de Développement Social a grouping of Montréal citizens groups has supported the action unanimously.

With a well-timed recession and the mounting pressure from the community, development stopped after Phase 1

A LOT MORE HAPPENS. Citizens of Milton-Parc go on to grow beyond securing housing, fostering cultural events, supporting one another through mobilization and mutual aid. In 1992 due to financial hardship, the CMP had to sell the space to Bar des Pins.


Just short of 30 years, Bar des Pins closed down its operation. The CMP repurchased the space, and opened a call for proposals from the community

# Becoming a member of a bar cooperative?

For a one-time, always refundable share of \$20:

- ♦ 20% discount on all eligible goods
- Participate in open democracy
- Surplus profits that are not reinvested are evenly distributed to all members


